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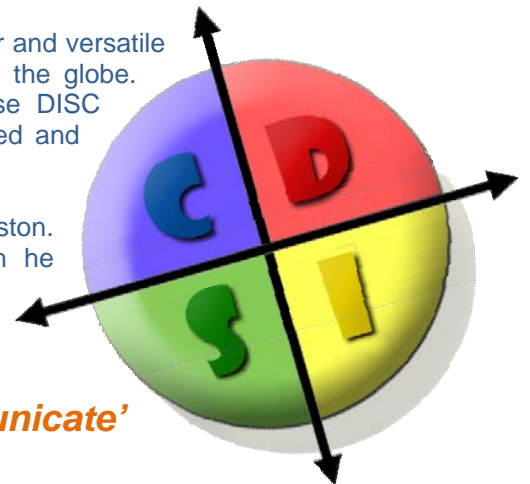

The DISC Profile (or DISC Assessment) is one of the most popular and versatile development tools used by organisations and institutions across the globe. Today, an estimated 75% of the Fortune 500 companies utilise DISC profiling in their businesses. It is one of the most commonly used and accepted profiling tools to ever be developed.

The DISC model was originally conceived by William Moulton Marston. Marston published "The Emotions of Normal People" in which he described the theory we use today.

DISC, put simply, examines OBSERVABLE HUMAN BEHAVIOUR.

'It's about how people prefer to act & communicate'



Why is DISC Popular?

- **It's User-Friendly:** Only 4 quadrants make up the model. The DISC language is nothing more than how people prefer to behave, act and communicate which you can pick up just by spending time watching people.
- **It's Intuitive and Relatable:** It's not abstract theory and certainly no psych-degree is required to learn it. DISC is directly linked to people you know in real life and can relate with every day.
- **It's Fun and Colourful:** Enjoyable to learn, discuss and apply to any facet of your life.
- **It's Insightful:** Eye-opening "ah-ha" moments. Often there are comments like "That makes immediately sense – I now understand why my partner does that!"
- **It's Powerful:** Dramatically enhance workplace and personal relationships at any level.
- **It's a Universal Language:** All people, regardless of age, race, country, culture or gender have a DISC style. It is a **common language** for people to better understand their own behavioural style, others preferred style, and learn ways to adapt their behaviour for maximum personal effectiveness.

Introduction to DISC

DISC is the most simple, accurate and fun model of human behaviour that exists today. The DISC model groups 4 common behavioural patterns found universally in all people (represented by 4 colours) which people can then use as a shared language to better relate and communicate with each other (both personally and professionally). DISC can be seen as a tool for identifying and effectively handling the different types of people which you will encounter in your work and society at large.

One of the great things about the DISC model is that it is remarkably easy to learn. It examines only a person's **behavioural style**, that is, a person's way of doing things (it is also often described as someone's **communication style**).

All people, regardless of age, race, culture, country or gender, share similar behavioural characteristics. One person you meet might be talkative, sociable and loud, whilst the next might be quiet, shy and methodical. These behavioural quirks can make clicking with someone similar to you feel like a breeze, but for those who are not, it can make life tricky, challenging, and even exhausting at times – particularly if you have to work with them.

What's interesting about people is that even though we are all infinitely diverse in our mix of experiences, intelligence, talents, values and beliefs, in terms of just behaviour it has been found that there are 4 common patterns that are universally shared. Over time, these 4 'styles' have popularly become known as the DISC model of human behaviour.

At a glance, the DISC acronym stands for:

Dominance: How you approach problems and challenges.

Influence: How you interact with and attempt to influence people.

Steadiness: How you respond to the pace of the environment.

Compliance: How you respond to rules and regulations set by others.

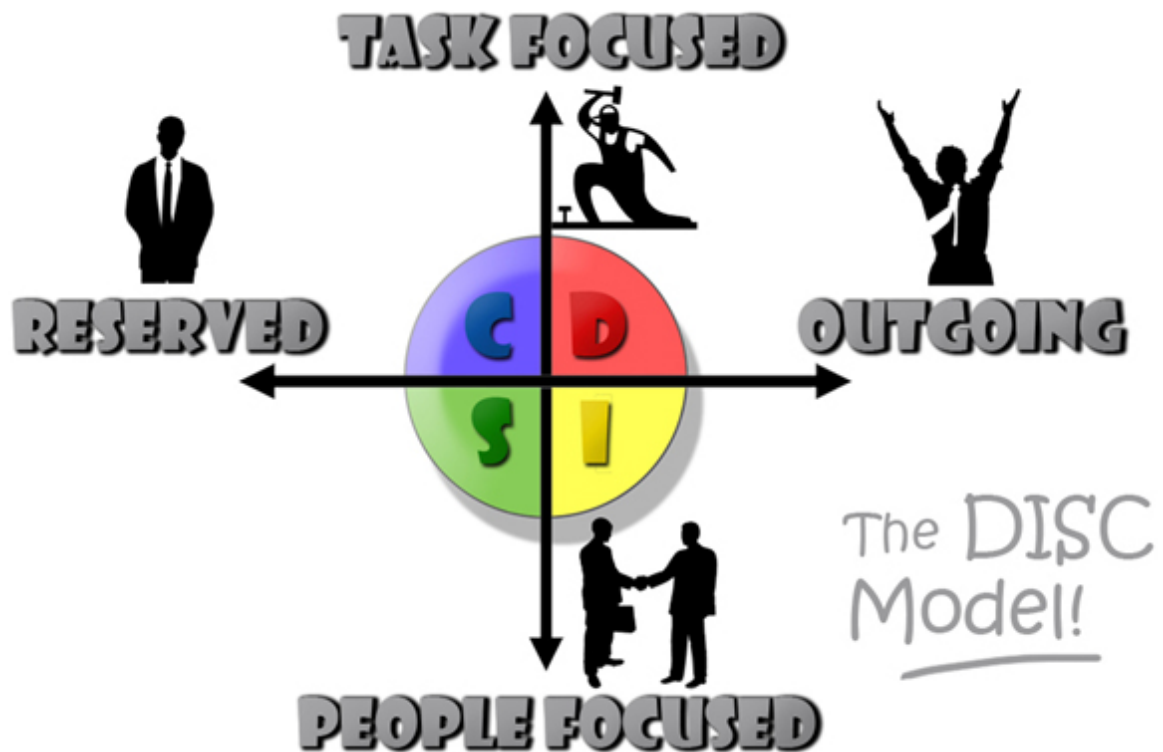
All people exhibit some behaviour in each dimension, however most people naturally prefer just 1 or 2 over the others. This preference is usually established at a very young age and will tend to remain consistent throughout the course of life. Some people, for instance, have a strong natural preference in the D dimension and will tend to exhibit behaviour that is direct, decisive and assertive. Other people have a strong natural preference in the S dimension (the opposite of the D) and will tend to be more reserved, indirect and passive.



The impact of what this means to you is that the D and the S are living in completely different "communication universes" and are galaxies apart in terms of how you should go about interacting with them.

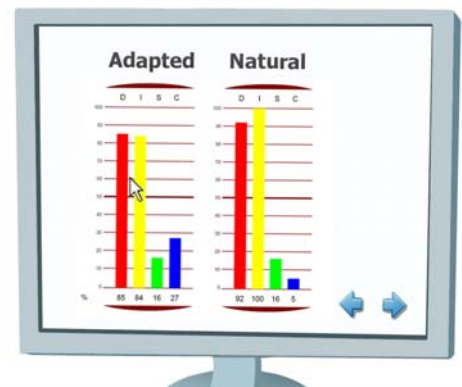
Think of it like landing on a planet on which there live only 4 native tribes, each with a distinctly separate language and acceptable customs. By doing a particular thing that is celebrated in 'D land' may actually be perceived as a criminal act in 'S land.' Only by spending time with each of the tribes, carefully observing, and then taking steps to act in a similar way, will you discover that those people will embrace you as one of their own.

It may sound simplistic at first, but the truth of human communication is that since the dawn of our species there have always existed only 4 core behavioural styles, and adapting your behaviour to suit another's primary style will dramatically enhance your ability to communicate with them. And that's DISC in a nutshell.



Key Points on DISC:

- DISC is the universal language of observable human behaviour. Research has shown that people, in terms of 'how they act' universally have similar characteristics. Consistently, these characteristics have been grouped into 4 distinct quadrants.
- We are not just simply 1 factor. It is the intensity of all 4 dimensions as measured by the DISC assessment that makes each of us unique (including both high scoring and low scoring).
- The DISC model is a simple way for people to (1) understand their own behaviour, (2) identify other people's style, and (3) adapt their communication for enhanced relationships and increased effectiveness.



- Gives individuals **skills** to understand their own **communication style** and **relate** to others more effectively.

- Provides a **common language** for change.

- Helps improve **Emotional Intelligence (EQ)** and build organisational **resilience**.
